Big Question: How might making lead to literacy?

- Big Ideas: 1. Pathways to literacy may not start with the written word.2. Making can offer an entry point to literacy for our most marginalized students.
- Maker Movement
  - Seymour Papert, MIT Professor: Father of the maker movement and coined the term *constructionism*, which builds upon Piaget's constructivist learning theory.
  - Maker Movement: "Growing number of people who are engaged in the creative production of artifacts in their daily lives and who find physical and digital forums to share their processes and products with others." (<u>Halverson & Sheridan, 2014</u>)

• Making: Using tools and materials with a product in mind, "a personally meaningful activity (that) makes learning real and shareable" (<u>Martinez & Stager, 2013</u>)

#### - Modern literacy

- Traditional literacy: Reading/writing in print, cognition + communication + emotion
- Critical literacy: Taking a critical stance toward text; using strategies to understand the message and/or author's intent (Wikipedia)
  - Founded in social justice (Pedagogy of the Oppressed, P. Freire, 1970, 2000), "requires imagining others' intentions, adopting multiple perspectives, and imagining social arrangements that don't yet exist" (Johnston, 2012).
- New literacies: "Includes the traditional literacy that evolved with print culture as well as the newer forms of literacy within mass and digital media" (Jenkins, 2006)
  - Examples: tinkering, web research, blogs, multimedia, animation, podcasts, social media, wikis, video games, online chat, coding
