

Why at a Secondary Level?

- Rasinski, Padak and Pytash (2009) state that parental involvement is the single best predictor of academic achievement.
- Zygouris-Coe (2007) states that children whose parents participated in family literacy programs had improved grades, test scores, reading skills, and were less likely to drop out of school.
- National Parent Teacher Association (2010):
 - 30 years reported positive connection between parent involvement and student success.
 - Parent involvement is the most transformational type of educational reform.

Continuation

- Facilitate communication between families and schools.
 - More face-to-face time
 - More guided practice, modeling, individualized attention
 - Studies have shown that parents who have a greater involvement in their children's schools have children who are more academically successful (Tystad, 2010).
 - (Zygouris-Coe, 2007; Lynch, 2009; Jayroe & Brenner, 2005).
- Draw upon strengths of parents.
 - Parents are the first teachers of their adolescents.
 - Parents know their adolescents the best.

Theory

- Theory: Social constructivism (Vygotsky, 1978).
 - Collaboration among others produces an understanding that none of the participants could produce alone (Forman & Cazden, 2013).
 - Discussion increases comprehension (Forman & Cazden, 2013).
 - Children learn as a result of social interactions (Vygotsky, 1978).

Why are some parents not helping at home?

- Many do not have or feel they have the necessary skills to help their sons or daughters at the secondary level (Wasik & Van Horn, 2012).
 - Many parents have limited reading skills (Wasik & Van Horn, 2012).
 - 30 million adults in the United States lack the literacy skills essential to perform everyday tasks (Wasik & Van Horn).
 - Globally, 83.7% of adults are not literate (Wasik & Van Horn).

So how can we help these parents?

- Can still be important literacy leaders.
 - Discussing texts
 - Rasinski, Padak, and Pytash (2009) state that just ten minutes of discussion around a text can lead to higher-order thinking.
 - Fostering a home literacy environment
 - Having texts at home
 - Showing the importance of texts by modeling reading
 - Gallagher (2009) claims that one of the best ways to end the illiteracy epidemic is to model the value of reading to students.
 - Guiding/Modeling/Helping parents

- Measure of Academic Progress score of 200-217.
- Treatment group: 10
- Control group: 10
- Completed group: 4
- Comparison group: 4

Mixed-Methods Research

- 12-weeks
- One-week for pre-assessing (QRI-5 (Leslie & Caldwell, 2010), Achieve3000, coded discussions, <u>student surveys</u>, <u>parental interviews</u>)
- One-week for post-assessing (same assessments)
- Between one and three weeks on the following skills and strategies:
 - Discussion
 - Vocabulary acquisition
 - Activating prior knowledge
 - Questioning

The importance of discussing texts.



Proven Results

Have you observed any improvements in this/these student(s)? If so, briefly explain.

Both students are very motivated and hard working with their mentors. They have both shown growth in terms of confidence, making book choices, word decoding, and comprehension. Both of their MAP scores improved significantly! I can't thank these two amazing mentors enough! Both of the students look forward to their time with their mentors. They both provide so much background knowledge, expertise, and patience!

Sean: Focus is writing. Observed improvements in focus, attention, reflection, and completing work. Utilizing think aloud skills. 90% of Sean's academics need to be with a 1-1 adult. Even though his writing skills have not necessarily moved up in benchmark scores, he is truly receiving the most benefits with his mentor. (You will see Sean's MAP scores go up. He was in reading intervention for 12 weeks. Every once in awhile he would work on reading with her.) Esperansa: Focus is reading and writing. For reading, mainly vocabulary, schema, context clues and meaning. For writing, clearly communicating ideas and concepts for writer and audience understanding. Her motivation and confidence have GREATLY improved with her mentor!!! She loves working with her!






