MINDFULLY IMPLEMENTING RESEARCH BASED PRACTICE

On October 6, we had the privilege to listen to Deb Zarling speak about to how educators are bombarded with information on what is the "BEST" way to teach our students. As literacy educators and leaders, we make decisions that impact our students learning and lives on a daily basis.



Deb spoke on how we are supposed to use "research based practices", and make data driven decisions, but what does that really mean and how do we know. How do we make decisions and activate these decisions with others?

Deb Zarling provided an abundant amount of information which allowed us to both reflect and collaborate. on what we are currently expected to do and how to advocate to provide what's effective high quality instruction and assessments to help our students work to their full potential.



COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECT UPDATE:

The purpose of the Muirland Literacy Council community service project is to provide Birthday Book Bags and Bedtime Book Bags to community children. Muirland Literacy Council members desire to get books and essential items into the hands of kids experiencing transition or economic challenges. Book bags are donated to local food pantries within the Muirland area and distributed by pantry volunteers. 



Forest by Brendan Kearney

Fisherman Finn and his dog, Skip, are out enjoying the beautiful rainforests of central America, when they discover that a lot of the trees seem to be missing. The next morning, they wake up to find several animals in their camp looking for food. Finn and Skip start to wonder what is going on and set off to uncover the truth. This lighthearted story with an important message is a wonderful introduction for little readers on the devastating effects of deforestation and how they can work to protect the environment around them.





I Don't Want to READ this Book by Max Greenfield

A reluctant reader sets out to read a book; the only problem is that the reader (who is the story's narrator) DOES NOT want to read the book. Why read a book when you already know what's going to happen? You could eat cake instead. Or watch YouTube. Or do both at the same time. Filled with punchy typography and zany graphics, this humorous book is ideal for enthusiastic and hesitant readers alike.



UPPER ELEMENTARY 3-5 BOOK RECOMMENDATIONS The Vanderbeekers to the Rescue by Karina Yan Glaser

Mama receives exciting news! Perch Magazine wants to feature her bakery business. However, an unexpected visit from the city inspector threatens to dismantle everything Mama has worked to build! The five Vanderbeeker children whose ages range from 6 to 13, band together to save their mother's bakery business. This endearing story is sure to give readers a glimpse of urban life in Harlem and entertain them with the family's antics and adventures.



BEN MIKAELSEN PF.TF.Y

Petey by Ben Mikaelsen

In Bozeman, Montana on a spring day, wet snow covers the ground. Kids are walking home from school, playfully tossing slushy snowballs at each other. An unusual squealing sound pierces the air. Petey Corbin, an older man in a wheelchair, curls up in order to shield himself from the snowball attack. Petey was born with severe cerebral palsy and is unable to speak clearly or protect himself. Trevor Ladd, an eighth grader commands the bullies to stop while shielding Petey with his body. The eighth grade boys proceed to pelt Trevor with snow. Just as the boys rush off, a nurse demands Trevor to get away from Petey. Trevor explains the situation to the unconvinced nurse. An unlikely friendship develops between Petey and Trevor. This story provides valuable lessons to foster empathy and compassion for others.

MIDDLE SCHOOL RECOMMENDATIONS

<u>Finding Junie Kim</u> is a combination of realistic and historical fiction. Present-day themes of growing up, friendship, and discrimination are interwoven with stories of survival during the Korean War. Junie's school is struck with racist graffiti and Junie herself deals with a racist bully on a daily basis. When she begins to interview her grandparents for a school project, she learns of the strength her family needed during the war and it helps her find her voice in the present day. <u>Mascot</u> is a realistic fiction book about moving forward. Noah survives a car crash that kills his father but his injuries require the use of a wheelchair. He used to be known for baseball and now he isn't sure what his identity is. He's mad about his lack of control over his current situation, but it isn't until his friends and neighbors recruit him to help them out that he realizes the power that he still has. (released 9/18)

<u>The Total Eclipse of Nestor Lopez</u> is a fantasy novel with themes of helpfulness and trust. Nestor has the ability to speak to animals, but he tries desperately to keep this to himself and fit in as he moves around the country with his military family. With his dad on deployment he doesn't want to give his mother anything more to worry about. The family's latest move is to live with Nestor's grandmother, in his dad's childhood home. When strange things start happening to the local animals and his grandmother comes under suspicion, Nestor must decide whether he can trust his friends and share his secret to save the day. 
HIGH SCHOOL & ADULT BOOK RECOMMENDATIONS

The Firekeeper's Daughter - Angeline Boulley

This YA book is one of the best I've read in a bit. It's a lengthy read, but well worth the time. I read this book as an audiobook and thoroughly enjoyed every minute of it.

The book follows an 18 year-old girl named Daunis. Daunis lives in two cultures. Her mother is white and comes from a very wealthy family. Daunis's dad was Native American, and although he has passed, Daunis spends a significant amount of time with her aunt and other Native American members of her tribe.



Both her tribal community and the non-tribal community are struggling with the effects of the production and sale of Meth in their community. In fact, Daunis's uncle, her mother's brother, has recently passed away of an apparent overdose.

Daunis is approached by the FBI to become a confidential informant to try to end the hold that meth has on their community.

This book is part romance, part mystery, and part exploration of Native American culture. You will leave this story having learned so many things about Native American culture; it will definitely show you many things you didn't know before.


