


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How The Moon Was Formed


Scientists have different ideas about how the Moon was formed. Many scientists think evidence shows that a collision between the Earth and another object formed the Moon, four billion years ago.




Other scientists think that the Earth and Moon formed separately, around the same time, from swirling clouds of rocks and dust in space. Some scientists even think that the Earth "stole" the moon from Venus! No one really knows for sure.

Fiction: The Moon is made of cheese.Fact: Yum! But no. The Moon is made of rock.




Fiction: The Moon produces light. Fact: The Moon reflects light from the Sun.




Fiction: Aliens live on the Moon.


Fact: Only in our imaginations!

Timekeeper




We see each face of the moon once every 29.5 days. This is a lunar month. People have used this regular cycle to count and record time since the beginning of human history. The word *month* comes from the word *moon*!



Gravity is the pull between all things. Larger things have more gravity than small ones. The Earth's gravity keeps the Moon orbiting around it.

The Moon exerts gravity on the Earth too. The Moon, along with the Sun, pulls large bodies of water towards it, as the Earth spins on its axis. The oceans bulge on one side at high tide.



Myths and Legends

People have been watching and wondering about the moon since the beginning of human existence.


- Have you ever heard of the Man in the Moon? In German cultures, the moon is called "Mister Moon".
- Anningan is the name of the moon god for some Inuit people. He chases his sister, the sun goddess, across the sky.
- Several cultures, including ancient Chinese and Mayan people, saw a rabbit hiding in the face of the moon.
- For the Ibibo people of Nigeria, the moon and sun were husband and wife who leapt into the sky to escape a flood.
- Many cultures, including the Algonquin people of North America, have names for each full moon in a year. The full moon in October is often called the Harvest Moon.
- To the ancient Greeks, the moon was a goddess named Selene. Her name is the source of the word *lunar*.

The moon was but a chin of gold A night or two ago, And now she turns her perfect face Upon the world below.


